GPs from Dounby will continue to visit on Mondays, Tuesday, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Nurse Practitioners will continue to cover all emergencies and out-of-hours calls. The female GP, Dr Mimi Thomas, comes over on Thursdays; all other GP clinics are covered by Dr Jonathan Kirk or Dr Huw Thomas.

The above hours are the times when Administrative staff are available to make appointments, take prescription requests, dispense previously requested prescriptions, and so on. The Nurse Practitioners are able to see people outside these hours, by appointment. If you need to make an appointment with the NP, but the main office is closed, please phone the Nurses' direct line on 01856 821406.

A few reminders

To prevent delays in getting any medication, please order AT LEAST five days before you will run out.

Please try, whenever possible, to order early in the week.

If you think your appointment is likely to take longer than the standard 15 minutes, please let us know when you book it.

We can book longer appointments and are happy to do so.

Please arrive on time for your appointment.

All our GPs have boats to catch, and one person arriving late can have a knock-on effect for the rest of the clinic.

If you are travelling to a medical appointment outside Orkney, we can book your travel for you.

We can safely dispose of medication that you no longer need, or that is out of date. Please just hand it in at Reception.

Proxy Voting

The Trust would like to remind every member of their right to appoint a proxy to vote on their behalf, if they are unable to attend the AGM. A member who wishes to appoint a proxy must:

Lodge with the Trust, at our Office, a minimum of 48 hours before the AGM, a written instruction (this can be an e-mail), stating who they have appointed as 'proxy' and what they can vote on, i.e. changes to the Articles of Association, appointment of accountants, and/or appointment of directors. Currently these are the only items on the agenda that the members will be asked to vote upon.

A proxy need not be a member of the Trust. A proxy appointed to attend and vote at any meeting instead of a member shall have the same right as the member who appointed him/her to speak at the meeting on their behalf.

Brinian Play Park Grand Opening

On a somewhat blustery afternoon of 14th October, the new play park at The Brinian in Rousay was opened, with Tyler Tunbridge, the youngest pupil at Rousay Community School, pulling the ribbon. The play park was funded by the Trust and The Big Lottery Fund and is adjacent to the Rousay Allotment Association polytunnel, which also sported its new cover! Project Manager, Michelle Koster addressed the children themselves, thanking them for their contributions for what they thought should be included in the play park, during an event held at The Crafthub, the previous summer. The Trust prefers to use local contractors wherever possible, and they were all thanked for their input and contributions.

The play park had originally be approved for development by the Board during 2015 and the Trust extend their warmest thanks to the local residents of Johnstons Road, for their patience and forbearance during the various construction phases over the past year. Once the ribbon had been pulled, the children swarmed in to the site, enjoying the new climbing frame roundabout, in particular. Katelyn Farquhar, the oldest pupil in the school, cut the cake inside the polytunnel itself, as Mums and Dads were thanked for braving the windy weather, and some of the balloons handed out, escaped in the winds! Particular thanks were extended to Marion's Shop for sourcing the cake and refreshments; and to Ian Donaldson to ensuring the polytunnel was cleared ready for use.

Tenders Welcome: Grass Cutting

The Trust would like to welcome tenders for regular grass cutting and basic general maintenance at both the new Brinian Play Park and Allotment Site (approximately half an acre in size). Initially this will be for a one-year contractual period.

The aim of this exciting new venture is to show that, instead of curtailing community wind turbines when the grid reaches capacity, turbines can continue working, and the electrical energy generated can be diverted to secondary heating systems in our homes, causing our primary heating systems to work and cost less!

Your Islands, Your Choice

Voluntary Action Orkney, in partnership with The Orkney Partnership and Orkney Health and Care has been awarded funding (from the Community Choices Fund and partners), to carry out an innovative pilot funding project, which is being delivered to the isles in Orkney. The project is called, *"Your Islands, Your Choice"*.

The delivery of the project falls into 3 main stages.

The first is a period of consultation using a survey followed up by the **second, an island meeting** to look at the results of the survey and identify what works well in your community and what the community would like to see improved or introduced. The paper survey can be found through the Community Association, the Community Council or the Development Trust, or by contacting ourselves at VAO, but the link to this is **Survey Monkey** is here <https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/W5Y2LVQ> and we would like **everyone** in your community to complete this if at all possible. It's a short deadline, (3 ½ weeks), and would need to be completed by the **18th November**.

The more people that we can get to complete the survey, the better the idea we'll have of what your island's potential issues are. Although there are 14 questions it's not too onerous and can be completed quite quickly. **You don't need to answer every question to move through the survey.**

Once we've collected each island's feedback, we will come out for the island visit and a public session to determine which issues could be identified with the pot of money available. The next morning, we will be on hand to talk to groups (whether constituted or not) who want to pitch for the pot of money to address the issues deemed most important, or able to be achieved.

Thirdly, in March next year, we'll host a big event in Picky, where all the applicants are invited to deliver a 2-3 minute pitch (a bit like Dragons' Den!) and then the people in the isles will then vote for their favourite projects. The projects who receive the most votes will receive funds.

RSPB Scotland

Onziebust Project



Orkney is home to truly incredible range of wildlife and is important in a UK and world context. The island group of Rousay, Egilsay and Wyre are a fantastic example the range of habitats and species found on Orkney. This is due to the mosaic of habitats found here; from the moorlands that offer excellent chances of seeing hen harriers and short-eared owls to the bustling seabird cliffs and wetlands which support nationally important numbers of wildfowl and waders. Relatively unimproved farmland provides opportunity for corncrakes, buntings, finches, wildflowers and bumblebees.

Our Onziebust reserve on Egilsay is managed for corncrake, waders and greater yellow bumblebee. Orkney is one of the few remaining core areas for breeding corncrakes in the UK and Egilsay is in a strategically important location. Corncrakes are a species of conservation concern due to catastrophic declines as a result of increasingly intensive farming. Orkney also holds some of the highest known densities of breeding curlews in the world on areas of wet, unimproved land within the agricultural landscape. Curlews are a globally threatened species and have experienced an overall UK decline of 42 per cent between 1995 and 2008. Onziebust reserve is has supported 55 pairs of curlews and over 300 pairs of breeding waders in total at its peak. It is also a core site for the rare great yellow bumblebee which once found throughout the UK is now only found on the north coast of Scotland and some of the islands.

In 2015 a major project was initiated to invest in the Onziebust farm reserve over a period of eight years. This project seeks to change management of the reserve from a non-residential warden managing contracts and grazing lets to an in-house farming system with a team of staff managing all farm work. We want to create opportunities for interested people to learn about managing land for wildlife and will develop a training programme which will include an internship scheme for anyone interested in a career in wildlife conservation.

Having secured internal funding for phase 1 we have begun to make improvements to infrastructure this year. The farmhouse is being renovated to accommodate a resident staff member and a number of stretches of fences have been replaced. Some farming equipment has been purchased.

We are currently seeking external funding for Phase 2 which is due to start in 2017. We hope to recruit a resident farm manager and warden and start a cattle herd. By 2019, we will also have a resident stockman. We hope to upgrade the bothy to accommodate residential volunteers, to build a new cattle barn and replace the roof on another for storage. Further farming equipment will be purchased for cultivation, mowing and habitat management.

Following an initial meeting with the Egilsay community in July we would now like to provide an opportunity for the residents of Rousay and Wyre to hear about the project and to put forward any ideas to help shape the direction of future phases.

We are holding a drop in session at the Rousay Community School to provide information and to hear ideas. Tea, coffee and cake will be provided.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

I first mentioned the budget simulator in my June "Letter". Since then OIC officials have been busy customising it. Interestingly, the simulator allows you, for example, to suggest stopping **all funding** to our life-line Orkney Ferries and the inter-island air service, but not reducing the salaries of the aforementioned OIC officials nor sacking the Finance Department. Nevertheless, the simulator does give an indication of the difficult decisions faced by us councillors in setting the annual council budget, which is predicted to be even tighter this year.

I sat on the shortlisting and interview panel for appointing a new acting headteacher for Eday and North Ronaldsay primaries. The post was offered to Steve Miller, well known to staff and pupils at both of those schools.

Stephen Fraser, the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service's Station Manager for Orkney, kindly saw me about recruitment of firefighters in the Isles. He shall be coming out to Sanday's community council meeting on the 22nd November.

I paid a visit to Peter Rickard, Interim Manager of THAW Orkney (Tackling Household Affordable Warmth), a new charitable organisation with the aim of eradicating fuel poverty in Orkney. I was impressed by their joined-up approach. If you need a helping hand to achieve a cosy home, it is well worth checking out their website: <http://www.thaworkney.co.uk>

As a member of the Orkney College Management Council, I attended this year's graduation ceremony at St. Magnus' Cathedral. While waiting for the procession to start, I noticed with horror evidence of last year's reception on the front of my red & gold doctoral gown, in the form of smears of blue icing sugar. Fortunately, the food colouring in it wasn't indelible. This year, another memorable reception was laid on by the students of the College's Hospitality Department, but this time I've made sure no reminders have remained for next year's graduation!

I accepted an invitation to meet with consultants from SKS Scotland, commissioned by the Sanday Development Trust to carry out a feasibility study and draw up a business plan for the regeneration of Kettletoft, a project supported by the North Isles Landscape Partnership. Many Sanday folk will have memories of the "Idea of North" study conducted by the Mackintosh School of Architecture in 2006. I am confident that this time the consultation is firmly grounded in realism.

Other meetings I have attended this month include those of the: Policy & Resources Committee, Monitoring & Audit Committee, General Meeting of the full Council, Stronsay Community Council, and the Leadership Board of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy. I have also engaged in a strategic planning workshop of the Orkney College Management Council, and been to seminars on serious organised crime and on the use of intelligence information in licensing.

Several schools in the North Isles still have unacceptably high speed limits on the roads passing by them. I have been informed that the Council's road team have commenced a survey of existing 40 mph speed limits across Orkney.

At last the "extra" wheelie bins at the Hatston depot are going to be put to good use. Each household in the Isles (with the exception of those in Shapinsay and Westray, which already have them for their alternate weekly collections) is going to be provided with two bins for storing recyclable items and bagged-up refuse. This means your rubbish can be kept outside in a vermin-proof container during the week and wheeled to the roadside on collection day. (The collection frequency will continue as at present.) In addition, the recycling points will be increased in capacity.

I have been asked how long one should expect to have wait for a response to a query made to a Council department. OIC has corporate standards for this which state that an acknowledgement should be received within 5 working days and a substantive reply within 25 working days. (I, personally, try to do much better than this.)

The next local authority elections will be held on Thursday, 4th May 2017. I intend to have a mini-manifesto in place by then, on which I will stand, and which (if I am re-elected) I will use as a basis to form an alliance with other like-minded councillors, so that it is backed with sufficient support to become implemented. In the next few issues of this "Letter" I shall be sharing my thoughts on various areas of council activity and what I am thinking of putting into my manifesto, and I would welcome feedback from the public. I shall start this month with education (so pupils, parents, teachers, prepare to get in touch ...):

Education: Much of the Council's education policy is directed by Scottish Government legislation. (Alarmingly, under SNP education reform proposals, local authorities may lose any role in education at all!) Nonetheless, there is still some scope for local variation and innovation. For example, I support our "Orkney Offer", which capitalises on the almost-unique situation that our local further education college is council-run. This enables pupils in S4, S5 & S6 to blend academic education and vocational training to suit their needs and abilities. I firmly believe that schools must teach skills for life, and two specific skills I want taught in Orkney schools are: 1) Touch typing — In a world where the keyboard is taking over from the pen, this indispensable skill should be introduced in primary. 2) Driving — One of the most essential qualifications one needs as an adult is a driving licence, and in the senior secondary years we should, at least, be preparing students for the theory test.

On the 15th November, I shall be flying to Papay for a meeting of their community council, and I'll also be going along to Sanday's community council meeting on the 22nd.
